# Term 2 2023 Carriculum Overview

Outcome 1: Children have a strong sense of Identity

Sustaining play by exploring the reciprocal nature of friendships

Developing language for play-entry to broaden social networks.

Support children in respecting themselves, others and the Kindy environment (including equipment). Revisit our Kindy Agreement.

Use pretend play theme to explore varying identities.

Child Protection curriculum – focus on relationships and trust networks

Outcome 2: Children are connected with and contribute to their world

Continue to explore habitats through Animals on loan from the Nature Education Centre.

Explore 'Winter' through Nature Kindy with a focus on wind, fire, water. Teach Firepit safety and cooking on the campfire.

Explore Reconciliation and NAIDOC. Learn about rules for living - and practices for Caring for Country, through Dreaming Stories and continue to learn Kaurna language.

Connect with our natural environment through sustainable practices supported by the Seasonal garden project, worm farm, nude food, water conservation, Nature Education animals, and the Kindy chickens.

# Outcome 3: Children have a strong sense of well-being

Zones of Regulation: embed the associated language into practice and utilise strategies to support regulation.

Facilitate collaboration, negotiation and a growth mindset with the support of Pete Persistence.

Support, model and reinforce health, nutrition and hygiene practices. Introduce **Brave** and **Able** dolls to teach Breathing techniques for regulation.

# Outcome 4: Children are confident and involved learners

Facilitate Parent Conversations to establish shared learning goals.

Encourage children to seek out and accept new challenges to extend their learning. Support children in learning projects that encompass a 'productive struggle' and draw on Pete Persistence to teach the language of learning.

Encourage inquiry learning to build positive selfidentities as learners e.g. exploring, experimenting, testing, predicting and reflecting.

### Outcome 5: Children are effective communicators

Focus on oral language development through building vocabulary specific to our pretend play theme.

Provide many opportunities for playing with language to develop phonological awareness. Facilitate Bookbased learning in small- group learning to support comprehension and a developing understanding of concepts of print.

Encourage children to express their ideas through the Arts using various mediums e.g., performing, dancing, sculpture, painting.

#### Preschool Quality Improvement Plan

Continue to model explicit communication strategies by providing empathetic responses while scaffolding children's play.

As a staff team moderate documentations of children's play interactions to identify teaching actions.
